Chief Judge John O. Colvin announced today that the United States Tax Court has adopted an amendment to its Rules of Practice and Procedure, including District of Columbia Emancipation Day, April 16, as a legal holiday for purposes of computing time as provided in Rule 25. The amendment is effective immediately.

The amendment will be formally published in the reports of the Court by the U.S. Government Printing Office. Copies of the amendment are available on the Court's Internet Web site, <u>www.ustaxcourt.gov</u>.

Chief Judge Colvin also announced that, consistent with Office of Personnel Management policy and the practice of other Federal entities, including other Federal courts in the District of Columbia, the Court will be open on April 16.

Paragraph (b) of Rule 25 is deleted and replaced with the following. Paragraphs (a), (c), and (d) remain unchanged and are omitted here.

RULE 25. COMPUTATION OF TIME

* * * * * * *

(b) District of Columbia Legal Holidays: The legal holidays within the District of Columbia, in addition to any other day appointed as a holiday by the President or the Congress of the United States, are as follows:

New Year's Day--January 1 Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr.--Third Monday in January Inauguration Day--Every fourth year Washington's Birthday--Third Monday in February District of Columbia Emancipation Day--April 16 Memorial Day--Last Monday in May Independence Day--July 4 Labor Day--First Monday in September Columbus Day--Second Monday in October Veterans Day--November 11 Thanksgiving Day--Fourth Thursday in November Christmas Day--December 25

Explanation

In computing a prescribed time period, the Internal Revenue Code excludes as the last day of the period a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in the District of Columbia. See Code secs. 6213(a), 7429(d), 7503. The District of Columbia has enacted legislation recognizing April 16, District of Columbia Emancipation Day, as a legal public holiday. D.C. Code secs. 1-612.02(c)(2), 28-2701 (2006); 52 D.C. Reg. 4569 (May 13, 2005). Accordingly, Rule 25(b) is amended to include District of Columbia Emancipation Day as a legal holiday in the District of Columbia for purposes of the computation of time as provided in Rule 25(a)(2). The amendment is effective immediately.
